







Message from Father Clive

Dear Parishioners.

The advertisements for Jif Lemon Day have been on our televisions for several weeks now but then this is not surprising as Pancake Tuesday is 1st March. Pancake Tuesday, or Shrove Tuesday as it is also known, serves a dual purpose. Many Christians observe the 40 days of Lent by making a Lenten sacrifice, by fasting, praying and engaging in various spiritual disciplines. Making pancakes is a great way to use up rich foods such as eggs, milk, and sugar, before the fasting season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday as fasting emphasizes the eating of simpler foods and refraining from eating to excess. It is not just about giving up chocolate or cake to shed a few pounds! It is about self-discipline. And it reminds us that much of what we take for granted is either a luxury for some or unavailable to many.

The other purpose of Shrove Tuesday is to allow Christians to repent of any sins. This name is from the Old English shriven, meaning to confess, and comes from an old custom of going to confession in preparation for the holy season of Lent. We still have A Commination service in The Book of Common Prayer. It is subtitled the Denouncing of God's Anger and Judgements Against Sinners which says that 'being admonished of the great indignation of God against sinners, ye may the rather be moved to earnest and true repentance; and may walk more warily in these dangerous days; fleeing from such vices...' Strong stuff indeed!

But let's flip the coin and look at it from another, less stark, perspective. Many of us enjoy a relatively comfortable life, but across the world there are hundreds of thousands of people who do not know where their next meal in coming from and who are forced to live in the most inhumane conditions. And even here, much closer to home, there are people extremely anxious about the rise in the cost of living and being forced to make the decision between fuel or food.

Lent gives us the opportunity to take a long, serious look at how we behave, to say sorry for when we have been greedy or selfish and make changes as to how we live. We do not need to use the complex theological language of admonition, confession and repentance. Mahatma Gandhi once said that people should "live simply so others may simply live".

This Lent we are inviting parishioners, along with any other things they may choose to do over those 40 days, to put something aside each day for the local Foodbanks. 40 items over 40 days! A simple act of kindness but perhaps the difference between someone having to choose between being cold or being hungry. We are asking for foodstuffs that are not perishable and have a long shelf life, toiletries and cleaning products. Donations can be brought to the churches on Easter Day (17th April) and we will get everything to the Foodbanks in Wells and Fakenham. Thank you.



HOUSEHOLD SUPPORT FUND

We are about to apply for our second amount of funding from The Norfolk Community Foundation, Household Support Fund. We are already planning to assist 36 local families but we could do more if there are further people in need you may be able to identify. This is not means tested and is provided on a no judgement basis. We will always seek to provide signposting if the recipient asks for it. (We have initially provided hampers to those recommended by the local schools, foodbank clients and Community Hub requests).

The fund enables us to receive a grant which enables us to provide a total of £50 fresh food/ and or fuel help to each identified Household. At Christmas we were able to provide 36 Christmas lunch Hampers, with the additional assistance of Volunteers and WUC (who provided funds to purchase toys for children). Due to good budgeting (and low prices at Christmas), we had surplus per family so are providing further half term hampers to all previous recipients on 16th February.

The fund has reopened again, we are able to apply for up to £10,000 Grant funds, which potentially could assist 200 families. We are happy to administer the grant, purchases and coordinate deliveries. If you have any people you would like us to supply hampers to, could you please let me know the volume initially, by 21st February latest as I will be submitting the funding request on this date.

News from Sculthorpe Parish Council

Our thanks to each and every one of you that took the trouble to write or email NNDC to say that you didn't want the boundary between us and Fakenham to change. Tony Walters and I attended the council meeting and put your opinions forward to the whole council. We were then strongly supported by Tom Fitzpatrick (our district councillor) who finished his speech by saying that he thought that the proposal regarding our boundary should be withdrawn in the name of democracy as it was not what the people wanted. I believe that all three of us were surprised when his comment was put to the vote and was passed with a healthy majority. So that's that for another few years until someone else looks at the boundary line and decides it needs to be "tidied up". Well done to all of us.

I've been contacted by one of our parishioners who believes that the field alongside the Swaffham road from the back of the Shell garage shouldn't be turned into a new housing estate. Your parish council hasn't had any notification that this is an imminent threat, but the land is in the district land plan as a potential development area and so this is quite likely to happen. As the land plans have now been finalised and published, following a time when the public were given a chance to comment, it is unlikely that we would have much chance of winning the argument against such a proposal but if you have a view please let your councillors know.

We can only represent you if we know what your feelings are. You can write to the Messenger, speak to one of your Parish Councillors or come along to any of our meetings. The next meeting will be held in the village hall at 7.00 pm on Wed 2nd March. That's the day after Shrove Tuesday or pancake Day as I've known it since I was a youngster.

So spring is here as far as I'm concerned. I was walking around the village and saw my first wild primroses in the woodland across the road from the bus shelter, and it made me realise again how fortunate we are to live where we do. Unfortunately someone seems to want to spoil our village and so they attacked the glass in the bus shelter and either they or another unhappy soul also smashed a window in the phone box/

library. The door of the phone box has also been broken and as it's a cast iron frame within a wood surround that has been damaged, replacing it will cost approximately £1000. Plus the couple of pieces of glass, that's likely to add up to about £1300 for repairs. There are about 270 houses in the village and so effectively that means that each household will be paying about £5 towards the cost of sorting the problem, and if we spend the money fixing vandalism we can't spend it on the nice things that we want to.

The police are aware of the damage but there is little that they can do as nobody knows who did the damages. Or do they? I'm pleased to say that there is very little crime in the village but none at all would be better.
