








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News from Sculthorpe Parish Church

Dear Parishioners,

In the days after Christmas, we watched several films on Netflix. One of these was 'Mandela: Long Walk to Freedom', the film starring Idris Elba that is based on the autobiography of anti-apartheid revolutionary and former South African President Nelson Mandela. The film ends with Mandela's famous quote ...

"No one is born hating another person because of the colour of his skin, or his background, or his religion. People must learn to hate, and if they can learn to hate, they can be taught to love, for love comes more naturally to the human heart than its opposite."

In February, love is 'in the air'! Yet the cards, flowers, chocolates and sentimental verses associated with St Valentine can be a pale imitation of the cost of true love. St Valentine was a clergyman, either a priest or a bishop. There are many stories associated with St Valentine, from restoring sight to a blind girl while under arrest to marrying Christian couples and otherwise aiding Christians who were at the time being persecuted by the Emperor Claudius in Rome.

By performing these marriages it allowed the husbands involved to escape conscription into the pagan Roman army and was a major inconvenience to the emperor when soldiers were sparse. To remind these men of their vows and God's love, St Valentine is said to have cut hearts from parchment, giving them to these persecuted Christians, a possible origin of the widespread use of hearts on St Valentine's Day. St Valentine was martyred by being beaten with clubs and beheaded and his body was buried at a Christian cemetery on the Via Flaminia in Rome.

Many couples choose St Paul's words on love as a reading at their wedding. He tells us that 'love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude', that 'it does not insist on its own way' and 'it bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things'. (1 Corinthians 13:4,5,7) What many seem to miss though is that

Paul is taking the Corinthians to task for their failure to love and for the dissension among them. True love goes far beyond romantic gestures. True love costs. It demands total and absolute commitment. It never ends.

St John of the Cross wrote that "in the twilight of life, God will not judge us on our earthly possessions and human success, but rather on how much we have loved".

May we all learn the value of true love!

- Dial 999 tell them your problem. They will tell you the code number to get the defibrillator from the box.
- 2. After you have the defibrillator IT will tell you what to do until further help comes.

News from Sculthorpe Parish Council

On behalf of your Parish Council I hope that your Christmas festivities went well. I wish you a 2022 in which some, if not all of your wishes come true. I realise that by now many if not most of your new year's resolutions are getting a bit fraid or more likely have, as have mine, been abandoned. The work of the Parish Council moves slowly on and it isn't too late in the year for you to consider taking an active part in running the village and making things happen by coming along to join in with the decision making. Our next Parish Council meeting will take place in the village hall at 7.00pm on Wednesday 2nd March and it would be really good to see you there.

In my last message to you I warned about a change of the village boundary by NNDC affecting the village part of your council tax. Two members of your Parish Council intended to attend the NNDC council meeting to fight against this change but unfortunately, due to Covid and the onset of the Omicron variant, the meeting was cancelled. We are currently awaiting notice of the meeting being reprogrammed and we will be there to fight to prevent it happening.

What else might your Parish Council be doing this year?

Apart from the day to day administration of keeping the street lights lit, the grass cut, hedges trimmed and pot holes in the road repaired etc. we are hoping this year to organise having the pond, opposite what used to be the TNS site (the tractor shop) on Creake Road, cleared and made into a pleasant village feature to the advantage of all the village and to make it a more bio diverse site for nature. We are having a speed monitor sign installed which can be moved around various positions in the village (the sort that measures your speed and flashes at you to slow down if you are breaking the speed limit). We are looking at the possibility of installing outdoor gym equipment in the park at the top of Moor Lane. Other smaller projects are also on the agenda.

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank the team that keep your village hall in tip top condition, arrange letting it out and a hundred and one other jobs that provide the village with this brilliant amenity and I really must thank the team that make speed checks on vehicles passing through the village in conjunction with the local police force. They dress up warm and can pop up all over the place at appropriate times of the day. Last year several cars that were speeding in the village were sent warning notices by the police as a result of the teams work and hopefully people will, as a result, act more responsibly and keep their speed down. The limit in the village is 30 but 20's plenty. Their work plus the implementation of the flashing sign should make our village a safer place to live. Speeding in the village can save people maybe 60 seconds in getting to their destination and puts the lives of our residents and school children at risk.

I'd like to thank all your parish councillors who join together with me to achieve some amazing things for the village with very limited resources. That list is just some of things that your Parish councillors attend to at the meetings which happen on the first Wednesday of every other month. The role is unpaid, but is a good way to give something back to Sculthorpe, so please consider getting involved as a councillor or just drop in to see what happens on the 2nd March. You'll be very welcome.
